When I took the oath of office as Maine's 75th governor, I never imagined that we would face a deadly pandemic. For nearly sixteen long, difficult months under a State of Civil Emergency, it was my responsibility to guide our state through this time to keep Maine people safe and healthy, and to put our economy on a path to recovery.

Dear Friends & Neighbors:

As we welcome the New Year, I want to once again thank the good people of Pittston for allowing me the opportunity to serve them at the State House. Challenges caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic still make daily headlines, while policymakers at all levels of government work to restore some sense of normalcy by exploring available options to preserve constituents' overall wellbeing. Maine's economy appears to be weathering these unprecedented times, as State revenue forecasters project Maine will collect \$822 million more than initially expected during the current two-year budget cycle ending in mid-2023 -- an increase of nearly 10 percent.

The Second Regular Session of the 130th Maine Legislature began January 5, 2022, and statutory adjournment is set for April 20, 2022. Legislators will attempt to finalize the various bills carried over from the First Regular Session, at the same time as taking into consideration new legislation deemed to be emergency in nature, dealing with budgetary matters, proposals from the Governor, initiatives submitted pursuant to statute, legislation submitted pursuant to authorized studies, and legislation submitted by direct initiative petition of the electors. Much of this business will likely be conducted virtually, so I would encourage you to monitor the Legislature's Web site if you have an interest in following proceedings.

Other means to stay up to date on the latest State Government news is by providing me with your email address so that it can be added to my regular e-newsletter distribution list, as well as signing up to receive notifications via Maine.gov at <https://www.maine.gov/portal/subscriptions/email.html>. Maine.gov offers a convenient way to sign up for free email and SMS text notifications. It also allows you to sign up for email and wireless updates about topics relevant to your interests.

Again, thank you for the privilege of being your voice at the capitol. It is a responsibility I am honored to have and do not take lightly.

Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.

Dear Friends,

On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the *American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It is an honor to represent you and your family during these challenging times, and I am thankful for the opportunity to update you on my work in Washington and Maine.

The COVID-19 pandemic continues to cause challenges for people in Maine and across the country. Please know that the health and safety of you and your loved ones, as well as the economic recovery of our communities, remains the driving force behind legislation I have pushed for in Congress.

In early 2021, Congress passed the American Rescue Plan, historic legislation that makes investments to crush the virus, create millions of jobs, provide direct relief to working families, and help schools remain safely open. Not only did this legislation give 90 percent of American households a stimulus check, but it also helped local and state governments better respond to the pandemic, put food on families' tables, got more vaccine shots into arms, cut child poverty in half through the expanded Child Tax Credit, and so much more. The American Rescue Plan is one of the most important pieces of legislation Congress will ever pass, and I'm so proud to have supported it from the beginning. Our economic recovery from the pandemic will be accelerated even more thanks to the bipartisan Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which Congress passed in November. This legislation marks the most expansive infrastructure investment since the construction of the interstate highway system. From funding to repair our aging roads, bridges, and ports to high-speed broadband expansion and legacy pollution clean-up, this law is a once-in-a-generation investment in our future.

In addition to working on COVID-19 relief legislation, my Congressional colleagues and I are also collaborating on legislation that addresses the climate crisis, supports voting rights, and—

through my role on the House Appropriations Committee—supports programs important to Maine.

After seven years on the House Appropriations Committee, I took the gavel and lead the subcommittee that oversees discretionary spending for the Department of the Interior, the Environmental Protection Agency, US Forest Service, and several agencies related to the arts and humanities. In my new role as Chair, I have fought to secure significant funding for Maine's tribes, environmental preservation programs, our cultural economy, and our forests.

I will keep pushing legislation to support America's long-term care needs, lower prescription drug costs, expand Medicare benefits, cut taxes for working people, make our workforce competitive with the world, and fight climate change.

So, as we reflect on 2021, let us welcome 2022 with a renewed sense of optimism. There is a lot to fight for, and I assure you I will continue to fight for Maine in Congress. I want you to know that my staff and I are doing all we can to support Mainers through this public health crisis and all the challenges that come with it. Dear Neighbor,

It remains the highest honor of my life to represent you in the Maine Senate, and I trust this message finds you and your family safe and healthy. Despite our hopes and aspirations, COVID-19 continues to play a significant role in our daily lives. But we persevere. Notwithstanding media headlines, the Legislature continues to do the people's work with productive bipartisanship.

In 2021, we addressed rising property taxes by restoring municipal revenue sharing to five percent by 2023 and bolstered the Homestead Exemption Program by refunding municipalities for 100 percent of the cost. After 17 long years, we fully funded K-12 public education at 55 percent, as the voters mandated in 2004.

We also created the Office of Affordable Health Care to ensure we're taking the best steps to lower costs and improve transparency in drug pricing. We know people have died because they couldn't afford their monthly insulin prescription, and so we enacted an insulin safety-net program to prevent needless harm to patients with diabetes and their families, putting the cost of the program on the pharmaceutical industry itself.

In the Labor and Housing Committee, which I chaired during most of the last session, we worked to address the housing crisis in Maine. We allocated \$10 million to a pilot program at Maine State Housing that increases access to safe and affordable housing opportunities for Mainers of all backgrounds. We will work to codify the transformative recommendations of the emergency Housing Commission I also chaired last fall.

On January 5, 2022, the Legislature began the Second Regular Session with statutory adjournment on April 20. On January 25, after one of my colleagues resigned from the Senate, I was appointed Chair of the Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee, a role I have always desired in my five terms in the Legislature. I'm excited to chair the committee that oversees veterans' programs, voting rights, election laws, campaign finance, liquor, lottery, gaming and cannabis laws, claims against the State, and much more.

We have continued our committee meetings remotely over Zoom, allowing more input from Mainers near and far. However, we will continue to meet in person at the State House as required by the Constitution and statute in order to debate and vote on legislation as reported out of committee. Our work is streamed live by audio and video and archived at www.legislature.maine.gov.

As always, I will continue to do the people's business in collaboration, cooperation and bipartisanship, bringing people together to find creative solutions to the most vital issues facing our state. The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2021. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Corrections' Services, Civil Process, Court and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including two K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) and a School Resource Officer for MSAD 49.

Despite the continued challenges that COVID presents to us all my entire staff continues with its mission of serving the citizens and visitors of Kennebec County, as well as the safe keeping of incarcerated individuals within our Correctional Facility.

In 2021, Law Enforcement Deputies logged thousands of calls for service. Our calls for service increased to near normal levels we experienced before the pandemic.

One type of call has increased dramatically: overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances. As the problem continues to increase, I wish to make it clear that we at the Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

Starting in 2021 a shift in the balance of call taking we had shared with the Maine State Police required my office to expand the Law Enforcement Division by two Deputies. These two positions were filled, which completed the staffing levels agreed to by the Budget Committee.

Our Patrol Division welcomed Deputies Dan Ross, Stephen Gould and Racean Wood as full-time staff on our team. Each of these men bring at least four years of experience as career law enforcement officers. Deputy Ross comes to us from the Gardiner Police Department, Deputy Gould worked with the Livermore Falls Police Department, and Deputy Wood served with the Somerset County Sheriff's Office. We also welcomed Reserve Deputy Nathaniel Sparling to our patrol division as a part-time Deputy.

In December of 2021 our office saw the resignations of Deputy Kulakowski and Deputy Carey. We wish them great success as they transition to new challenges and growing families.

My agency has been receiving federal funds to conduct patrol details specifically related to motor vehicle violations throughout the county. To date, the effort of Kennebec County Deputies

in those federally funded programs excel statistically for the number of interdictions for drug related criminal activities.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2021, the three civil deputies received over 7,124 requests for service in Kennebec County. This is an increase from 2020. Some of the services include, civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 1738 inmate intakes. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Trespass to Homicide. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility.

My staff at the correctional facility should be very proud of the way they have handled the COVID issue, containing those testing positive with the virus and stopping it from spreading.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the county, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

I would like to thank all my administrative staff who support the patrol division, detective division, correctional division and the civil deputies. The amounts of paperwork that is handled by these individuals is staggering and their work is greatly appreciated. Job well done by all.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2022, my focus will remain the same. Serve the people of this county and our visitors honorably and professionally through good common sense and good judgement.

There are **4 openings** on the **Budget Committee** , **1 opening** on the **Personnel Committee** , **3 openings** on the **Planning Board**, **1 opening** on the **East Pittston Water District**, (*must be a water district customer*) and there is **1 opening** on the **Select board/Assessor, Overseer of the Poor**. These are all 3 year terms. The municipal Election of Officers will be on Monday March 21, 2022 from noon to 7pm.

Just a friendly reminder, if you have not licensed your dog yet there is now a \$25.00 late fee per dog. Dog licenses are due December 31st of each year. You do have a one month grace period before the late fee goes on, on Feb 1st each year.

Our website is a good source of information to the latest news on what's going on in town. (www.pittstonmaine.org.) You can also sign up for regular updates from the town by putting in your email address and first name. There is also a link there to **renew** your vehicle/trailer registration and also a link to **renew** snowmobile/ATV and boat registrations.

We congratulate 24 couples that were married in 2021 and welcome 27 new bundles of joy. Sadly we will miss and remember the 49 loved ones that are no longer with us. When requesting Birth Certificates or Death Certificates or Marriage Certificates and Marriage Licenses, please allow extra time, or call ahead, as this process usually takes a little bit of time to do. They are all done electronically now. Certified copies are \$15 for first copy and \$6.00 for everyone after that. The Marriage license fee is \$40.00.

Sadly, we lost our Boston Post Cane recipient, Velma B. Albert, at the age of 99 on November 14th, 2021. She was a wonderful lady and will be missed by all. I will be looking for another recipient this year. If anyone knows of a person that would like to be considered, please contact me. This is for the oldest Pittston resident. Management's Discussion and Analysis

Town of Pittston, Maine

As management of the Town of Pittston, Maine, we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2020. The Town's financial performance is discussed and analyzed within the context of the accompanying financial statements and disclosures following this section.

Financial Highlights

- The Town's assets exceeded liabilities by \$3,404,481 as of December 31, 2020, compared to \$3,091,097 as of December 31, 2019.
- The Town's governmental funds General Fund Balance on a budgetary basis was \$1,523,713 as of December 31, 2020, compared to \$1,396,234 as of December 31, 2019.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the Town's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements include three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to the financial statements. The Town also includes in this report supplemental information to the basic financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements

The Government-wide Financial Statements include a Statement of Net Position and a Statement of Activities. These statements provide information about the activities of the Town as a whole and present both a long-term and short-term view of the Town's finances. Financial reporting at this level is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies.

The Statement of Net Position includes all assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in the Town's net position is one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of overall economic health requires review of other non-financial factors, such as changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's roads. While this review includes some financial elements important to an assessment of the municipality's overall economic health, this analysis is not exhaustive and intended to be used as one component of such an evaluation.

Management's Discussion and Analysis - Continued

Town of Pittston, Maine

The Statement of Activities reports the current year change in net position. This statement includes all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities is presented for:

- **Governmental activities:** most of the Town's basic services are reported here, including the police, fire, general administration, streets, and ambulance. Sales taxes, franchise fees, fines, and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.

Fund Financial Statements

For governmental activities, these statements focus on how services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the Town's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the Town's most significant funds. The remaining statements provide financial information about activities for which the Town acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of those outside of the government.

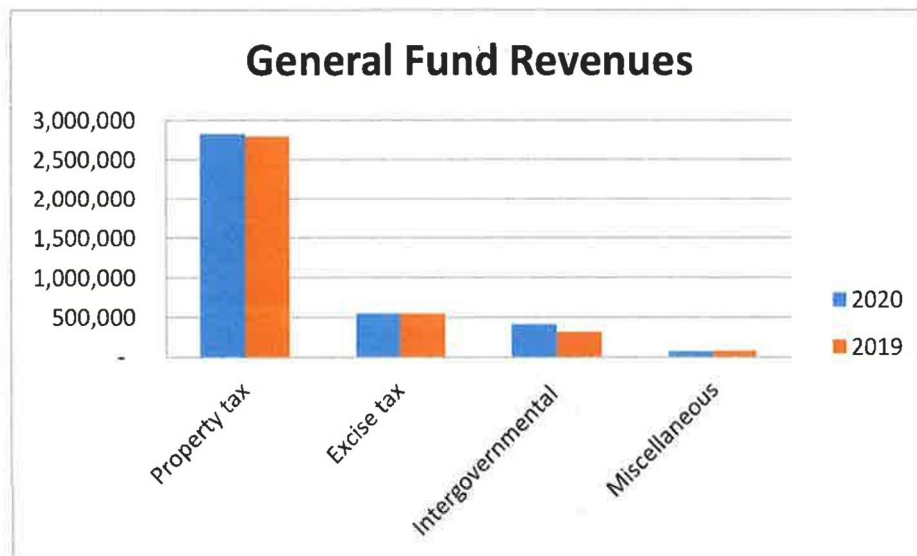

Financial Analysis of the Town's Funds - Fund Financial Statements

Our analysis of the Town’s major funds begins with the fund financial statements and provides detailed information about the most significant funds-not the Town as a whole. Some funds are required to be established by State law. However, many other funds are established to help control and manage money for particular purposes or to show the Town is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, and other money.

- Governmental funds - All of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. We describe the relationship, or differences, between governmental activities, reported in the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities, and governmental funds in reconciliation at the bottom of the fund financial statements.

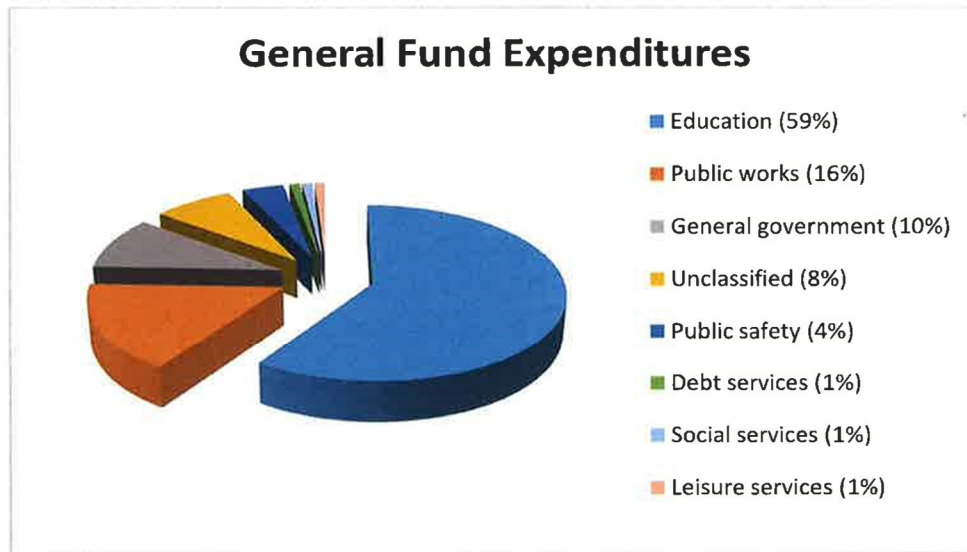
Comparative annual revenues in the general fund on a budgetary basis were as follows:

Capital Assets

As of December 31, 2020, the Town of Pittston's investment in net capital assets for its governmental activities amounted to \$1,617,855 compared to \$1,492,091 last year.

Long Term Liabilities

At year-end, the Town had \$180,489 compared to \$210,489 last year, in outstanding bonds. The outstanding bond is for the construction of the Village Fire Station.

Committee and Board Reports

Animal Control Officer

To the residents of Pittston,

First let me thank you for being such wonderful people during my time as Pittston Animal Control Officer. However, I have had to resign my position. Due to the ongoing mess involving Covid, my job at the Augusta hospital is taking up more and more time leaving me less and less time to fulfill my duties as Animal Control Officer. As such, I feel it is not fair to the residents of the Town of Pittston to continue in this position. However, to those who still have my number, and who have any questions they may need help with regarding your animals, please feel free to contact me.

This past year has been pretty much the same as 2020 was. The Covid restrictions and quarantines have caused an entirely new slew of calls that were not that common during the previous, non-Covid years. People and children being home instead of out and about have caused an increase in dogs at large complaints and reports of dogs and cats being missing. If your pet goes missing, quickly inform the Animal Control Officer with a description of your pet and the area it ran off from, as well as your contact information so you can be contacted if your pet is found. Contact the Kennebec Valley Humane Shelter with your contact information and a description of your pet in case someone brings your freedom loving pet to the shelter. If you live close to the Lincoln County town line, contact the Lincoln County Sheriff's office to leave a message for their Animal Control Officers with the same information. If you have the internet, post your pet on the unofficial Pittston Facebook page, as well as the Maine Lost dog (or cat) Facebook page. The quicker your pet's information gets out there, the quicker your pet can be returned.

Another good idea for pet identification are tags with a phone number and a microchip. While the town does not have a chip reader, the shelters and most Veterinarians do. The tags with your phone number gives anyone who happens to find your lost dog or cat contact information to quickly alert you to your pets' whereabouts.

As I mentioned above, most of my calls this past year consisted of at large/missing dogs or cats. Another complaint that comes with dogs at large are the loose dogs attacking and or chasing livestock, poultry and pets. Be aware that the state of Maine allows farmers and residents to shoot a loose dog that is harassing/threatening or attacking livestock/poultry, pets or humans. The dog owner is responsible for any costs involved with damages and costs when their dog attacks, kills or injures livestock, poultry and humans. They can also be held financially responsible for damage to property caused by their dogs. There are new laws regarding nuisance and dangerous dogs, which involve large fines, extra licensing fees and restrictions on your dog.

Among with more contact with pets comes bites, especially when kids and pets interact without proper adult supervision. Please, always be aware of your children's actions (especially young children) when around your pets. Watch for signs that your pet is uncomfortable with the children's behavior. There are several good online sites that show examples of what to watch for.

Again, feral cats are a problem in Pittston. Feral cats can and do carry rabies and a variety of other diseases that can be transferred to your pets, wildlife and humans. If you are going to support a colony of feral cats, please do the town and environment a favor and get the cats neutered/spayed and vaccinated. There are programs that will take feral cats and sterilize, vaccinate and treat for internal and external parasites, as well as mark the cats as being in a feral colony that is being cared for. These same organizations will take feral kittens, place them in foster homes and adopt out as pets.

As always, please license your dogs and make sure both cats and dogs are up to date on their rabies vaccinations.

With winter here, please be aware of the State of Maine laws for appropriate care, housing/shelters for pets and livestock. They can be found on the State of Maine web site or by calling the state of Maine Department of Agriculture Animal Welfare Office (287-3846).

Again, thank you for being such great and caring animal owners.

The road work season for 2021 was a busy one. Approximately 3000 yards of gravel was processed in the town pit, with materials being used on numerous projects around town. The grading of dirt roads, numerous small culverts were replaced around town, and ditching was done on various roads.

Some of the larger projects that were completed this year were: The Smithtown Road culvert replacement-which was completed using grant money the town was awarded, the Arnold Road culvert was also replaced. Both of these were repaved after the culvert replacements were completed. On the Palmer Road 3000 feet of it was rebuilt and then a base coat was paved. Stoney Acres Road was reconfigured for ease of use and repaved. The Stage Road had a surface coat of pavement put on it. In total, approximately 4 miles of roads were paved in town this year. I look forward to working with the town throughout this next year and I thank you for the continued support.

Appeals Board

The Pittston Board of Appeals met initially on August 26 to select officers and schedule further meetings. Current members are Becky Symes, Adria Horn, Autumn DeVries, Lisa Veregge and Paula Work. Becky Symes was elected Chair, Autumn DeVries was elected Secretary. In new business, the board accepted the request for appeal from Greg Bickford for further review. Mr. Bickford was appealing the condition set by the Planning Board that there be no more than five vehicles at his place of business on 5 Ripley Road.

The BOA met with Mr. Bickford and the Planning Board at a Public Meeting on September 9. During the discussion, the Planning Board presented a summary of their reasons for applying the approval condition of five vehicles.

A final meeting on Mr. Bickford's appeal took place on September 16. At that meeting, the BOA discussed in depth the wording and intention of the Business Development Ordinance, the Building Code, the summary decision from the Planning Board as well as discussion with Mr. Bickford. The Board of Appeals was unable to associate the Planning Board's condition of approval to existing Pittston ordinances, finding that the limit of five vehicles was arbitrary. Therefore, Mr. Bickford's appeal to dismiss the condition was approved.

Becky Symes participated in the MMA Local Planning Boards & Boards of Appeal Webinar on September 13 at a cost of \$45 from the Board of Appeals budget.

The BOA will begin in early 2022 on a Pittston appeals board checklist, so that residents and board members are more aware of the appeals process. Members of the public are welcome to attend these informal working sessions.

Budget Committee Report

At our meeting on 14 April 2021, we voted for chairman and secretary positions; Steven Costello was elected for Chairman and Cheryl Peaslee as Secretary.

Our first meeting for the 2022 budget was held on 8 December 2022. We discussed the upcoming Articles for the 2022 budget and the ARPA (from the Federal Government) monies that were awarded to the Town of Pittston. We reviewed the items submitted from the Fire Department and the East Pittston Water District. Chief Josh Johnson presented the items that he would like to have funded through the ARPA monies and Larry Ireland explained his submission for the Water District. The Select Board was still working the warrants articles for the 2022 budget and would have them ready for review at our next meeting on 4 January 2022.

We met on the 4th of January 2022 and did our first review of the upcoming warrant articles and the budget requests of those warrants. We had a review of the 2021 budget as a comparison to what was actually spent. Colleen Pilsbury (the Town's Treasurer) and Sarah Perkins stated that the Town is in good financial condition. We discussed the Excise Tax accounts and their balances and again it appears that we are in good condition financially. We went through the warrant articles and some articles are still being firmed up. We decided that we would review the entire warrant and vote on all of the warrant articles at our next meeting, which is currently scheduled for the 11th of January 2022 and if necessary, a follow-up meeting is scheduled for the 20th of January 2022.

I would like to extend my thanks to the members of the Budget Committee: Sam Snow, Larry Ireland, Hope Ricker, Cheryl Peaslee, Tim Lawrence, Lynette Eastman, Sarah Perkins and Jane Hubert. I would also like to thank the Select Board and the office personnel for their support.

Here are some helpful tips about your well.

Overview of Maintenance

Regular maintenance of your well is required to ensure the continued safety of your water and to monitor for the presence of any contaminants.

According to the National Ground Water Association, here are some steps you can take to help protect your well:

- Wells should be checked and tested ANNUALLY for mechanical problems, cleanliness, and the presence of certain contaminants, such as coliform bacteria, nitrates/nitrites, and any other contaminants of local concern, (for example, arsenic and radon).
- Well water should be tested more than once a year if there are recurrent incidents of gastrointestinal illness among household members or visitors and/or a change in taste, odor, or appearance of the well water.
- All hazardous materials, such as paint, fertilizer, pesticides, and motor oil, should be kept far away from your well.
- When mixing chemicals, do not put the hose inside the mixing container, as this can siphon chemicals into a household's water system.
- Consult a professional contractor to verify that there is proper separation between your well, home, waste systems, and chemical storage facilities.
- Always check the well cover or well cap to ensure it is intact. The top of the well should be at least one foot above the ground.
- Once your well has reached its serviceable life (usually at least 20 years), have a licensed or certified water well driller and pump installer decommission the existing well and construct a new well.

The Pittston Riverwalk

This year has been a difficult time for the Riverwalk Committee. Much of the work we had planned for 2021 was delayed because as we started work in May on the southern entryway a discrepancy about the location of the southern property line developed. Our southern property neighbor, graciously paid for a line survey and our property line proved to be considerable farther south than we had thought.

We were able to restart construction in October and with the help of Sam Snow, our Road Commissioner, we have a first class 30-foot-wide southern entryway. We are now ready to start repairing the road leading to the river and the recreation areas in early spring 2022. This will put us back on track to clear a picnic area and provide access to the river for fishing, kayaking and canoeing. By fall we hope to have an area set aside for hunter to sight in their rifles. If it is decided to open the area for hunting for 2022, the Riverwalk area will be closed to other activities through hunting season.

The Pittston Riverwalk Committee meet at the town office on the first Monday of each month, March thru November, at 6:00 pm, all are welcome and all your ideas are needed. Pittston Recycling Committee

Pittston recyclers recycled over 50 tons of corrugated cardboard, mixed paper, newspaper/magazines, glass, natural #2 plastic, colored #2 plastic, and tin at the Recycling Center located on the Whitefield Road (next to Central Fire Station) in 2021. Great job! The system seems to be running smoothly with the Lincoln County Recycling Program, and recyclers seem to have learned the routine. There are a few “hints” to make things a little more efficient: flatten corrugated cardboard at the seams (don’t crush), remove metal lids from rinsed glass jars and place those lids in “tin”, solid white #2 plastic (usually bleach and white milk jugs) are considered “colored” and, if you’re confused or need any help, please ask the attendant (or a volunteer that may be there) for that help. These people (attendant, volunteers and recyclers) are at the center in support of a better environment – we want to help!

The center is open Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and in the summer (May 1st through September 30th) it is open on Wednesday evenings from 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. although times may change due to holidays, weather and other conditions.

Recycling has managed to stay within its budget - -this year reducing the contract cost to Lincoln County budgeted at \$10,000 to \$5,317.36. Another financial plus is the legislation that has passed known as “Product Stewardship for Consumer Packaging”. This legislation requires manufacturers to reimburse towns for packaging processing (recycling) – a practice already being successfully done in Canada.

The Committee welcomes other volunteers at their occasional “as needed” meetings and hopes to increase activity with new ideas, suggestions of better operations and “just conversation”. Personally, I find the center to be a great place for socialization. I meet neighbors I don’t often stop to visit, “kids” I’ve had in school and new-comers to town. Stop by and talk to us.
