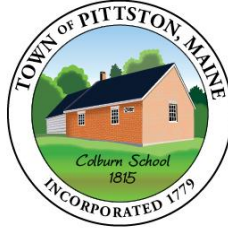

As we look ahead to the promise of an exciting 2023, the previous year has been one of several accomplishments. The board has seen more participation in our weekly meetings, by a larger variety of residents, than at any other time in recent memory. This is a wonderful development. Having more of you in the room or on video during meetings helps us to be more transparent and gain a better understanding of the perspective of our neighbors. We all deserve to be well informed about the activity in our municipal office and how our tax dollars are being used. Many thanks to all who have taken the time to be part of our municipal process.

To that end, we have invested in video conferencing equipment that is installed in the large meeting room. This equipment, and a subscription to Zoom, allows all our boards and committees to broadcast video of meetings to you in real-time or post recordings of meetings to our town webpage. No matter where you are, you can be a part of our meetings or just listen-in to keep up with progress of an issue that interests you. Please take advantage of this new way to access the work of boards and committees by visiting our webpage (pittstonmaine.org) for more details.

This past year also saw a rare *reduction* in our town's property tax rate. Moving from a mil rate of 14.2 to 13.75, the town will meet its obligations collecting less of your hard-earned income.

To improve transparency, we have changed the structure of this year's warrant articles to include line-item details describing how our tax dollars will be used. This helps us to more clearly communicate which accounts the money will be allocated to and what you can expect in the current budget cycle.

We also welcomed Jane Hubert back to the select board. Jane's wealth of municipal knowledge has been an asset to the town.

You are invited to join any of our board or committee meetings, sharing your perspective helps everyone make more informed decisions. Please check the town's webpage calendar for dates and times.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.


Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It is my honor and privilege to serve the people of Maine's First District in Washington, DC, and I appreciate the opportunity to share this annual update with you.

This past year, our state faced unprecedented challenges, mirroring the difficulties experienced by communities across the nation. High inflation rates, a rapidly changing climate, aging infrastructure, and increasing energy costs were among the top concerns I heard while home in the district. Keeping these in mind, I was proud to work with my colleagues in the Maine Delegation to pass historic legislation to bring federal dollars back to our communities.

One of the ways we delivered for Mainers was through the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) in August. This law provides much-needed assistance to struggling families. With the help of the IRA, Americans will save an average of \$800 per year on health insurance and Medicare beneficiaries will have increased access to medication.

Additionally, the IRA offers billions of dollars to expand rebate programs for Americans who wish to make their homes more energy efficient. Homeowners can now receive up to a 30 percent tax incentive for the cost of home solar installations and a 30 percent incentive when investing in a heat pump. Over the next decade, these rebates will offer Mainers thousands of dollars in savings while decreasing fuel costs for winters to come.

In 2022, Congress also passed meaningful legislation to help create skilled jobs in the construction, manufacturing, and engineering sectors. The Creating Helpful Incentives to Produce Semiconductors (CHIPS) Act will allow the U.S. to advance its leadership in the development of semiconductors used in the manufacturing of computers, cell phones, cars, and numerous other technologies we rely on. By developing this industry at home, we can bolster our national security and lessen our reliance on foreign technology.

As I look toward this Congress, I am excited to work with my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to improve the lives of Maine people. It is critically important that we continue to take action to increase job growth, decrease inflation, take measures to promote our national security and invest in our health care and education systems.

Each year my office receives over 40,000 calls, letters, and emails from Mainers. I recognize the tremendous trust you place in having me represent you in Washington and by sharing your stories, thoughts, and concerns. Please rest assured, I will continue to fight for the interests of Mainers in Congress, and my staff and I will do everything we can to ensure your needs are met.

The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2022. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Correctional Services, Civil Process, Court and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) and a School Resource Officer for MSAD 49.

While the severity of the pandemic is decreasing, my office shall remain vigilant. We will monitor for potential virus recurrence in our correctional facility and take all recommended precautions to reduce any impact that may threaten those in our custody.

In 2022, Law Enforcement Deputies again logged thousands of calls for service. Our calls for service have increased since 2021. Our geographic patrol responsibilities within the County have increased, as the state police have opted to reduce their rural patrol coverage.

Overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances continue to plague our country. My staff responded to 20 overdoses in 2022, we were able to save 11 lives. This number does not include the saves by jail staff in 2022. As the disorder continues to increase, I wish to make it clear that we at the Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

The patrol division welcomes Sean Dixon and Eric Thiess to our team. Deputy Dixon has 12 years of full-time experience working as a law enforcement officer. Deputy Theiss came to us from our correctional division. Deputy Theiss is currently at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy attending the 18-week program to become a certified law enforcement officer.

My agency continues to receive federal funds to conduct patrol details specifically related to motor vehicle violations throughout the county. Kennebec County Deputies continue to excel statistically for the number of interdictions for drug related criminal activities.

Through the federal grants system, we were able to purchase a Can-Am UTV and trailer to assist us with our duties serving all of Kennebec County. This tool is available to any municipality or law enforcement agency within the county.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2022, the three civil deputies received over 7,441 requests for service in Kennebec County. This is an increase from 2021 by over 300 services. Some of the services include civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

We welcome any questions regarding civil service to be made to the office. Kennebec is very lucky to have Chief Civil Deputy Harry McKenney, who just happens to be the go-to guy on civil service matters statewide. Keep up good work Chief!

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 1810 inmate intakes. This is an increase from 2022. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Trespass to Homicide.

Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. We have improved our medical and mental health services at Kennebec to help manage the needs of those incarcerated.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the county, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

The big news for my staff in 2022 was the purchase of 73 Winthrop Street in Augusta. This building will house the entire sheriff's office divisions which include administration, patrol, detectives and the civil division. Our mailing address will remain the same. More information on the move to follow within the next couple of months. Me and my staff are very excited to move into a larger and much newer building that we can call our own.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2023, I remain committed to serving the hard-working taxpayers of this county, their families and our visitors, honorably, professionally, and by using good common sense and judgement.

These are all 3-year terms. The municipal election of officers will be on Monday, March 20, 2023 from noon to 7pm at the Town Office.

When requesting a birth, death, or marriage certificate remember to have proof of lineage if requesting a certificate that is not your own. You may have noticed our new voting booths on November 8, 2022, which were used successfully. They take up less room and are very easy to set up and take down. In that election for Governor and other officials, we had 1534 votes casted. Which was 65% of the registered voters.

The population in town is 2875 according to the last census. We have 2,366 registered voters, there are 574 Democrats, 804 Unenrolled, 85 Green Party, 899 Republicans and 4 Libertarians. I want to thank all my ballot clerks for the great job they always do.

Management's Discussion and Analysis Town of Pittston, Maine

As management of the Town of Pittston, Maine, we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2021. The Town's financial performance is discussed and analyzed within the context of the accompanying financial statements and disclosures following this section.

Financial Highlights

- The Town's assets exceeded liabilities by \$3,887,723 as of December 31, 2021, compared to \$3,404,481 as of December 31, 2020.
- The Town's governmental funds General Fund Balance on a budgetary basis was \$1,813,962 as of December 31, 2021, compared to \$1,523,713 as of December 31, 2020.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the Town's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements include three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to the financial statements. The Town also includes in this report supplemental information to the basic financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements

The Government-wide Financial Statements include a Statement of Net Position and a Statement of Activities. These statements provide information about the activities of the Town as a whole and present both a long-term and short-term view of the Town's finances. Financial reporting at this level is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies.

The Statement of Net Position includes all assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in the Town's net position is one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of overall economic health requires review of other non-financial factors, such as changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's roads. While this review includes some financial elements important to an assessment of the municipality's overall economic health, this analysis is not exhaustive and intended to be used as one component of such an evaluation.

The Statement of Activities reports the current year change in net position. This statement includes all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

Management's Discussion and Analysis - Continued

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities is presented for:

1. Governmental activities: most of the Town's basic services are reported here, including the police, fire, general administration, streets, and ambulance. Sales taxes, franchise fees, fines, and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.

Fund Financial Statements

For governmental activities, these statements focus on how services were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the Town's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the Town's most significant funds. The remaining statements provide financial information about activities for which the Town acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of those outside of the government.

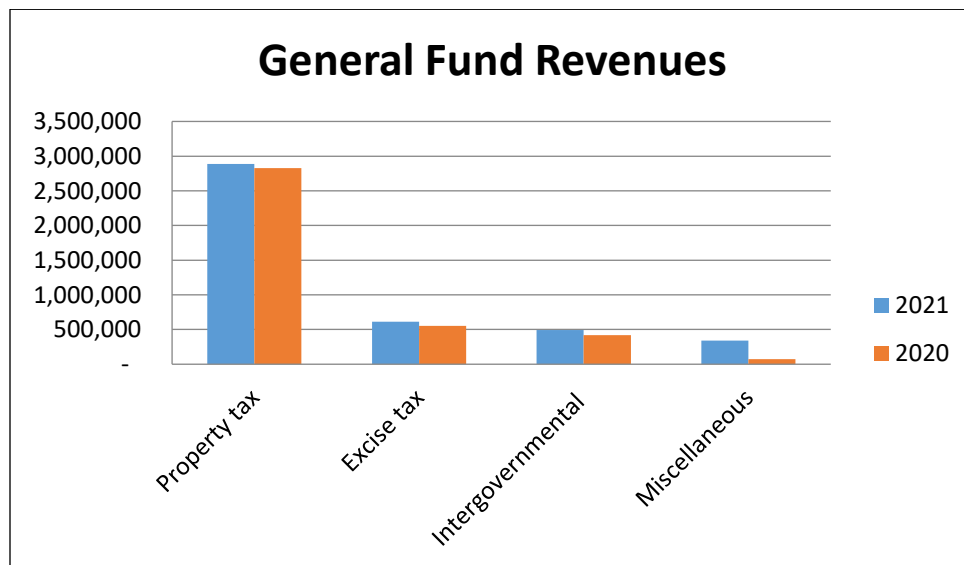

Financial Analysis of the Town's Funds - Fund Financial Statements

Our analysis of the Town’s major funds begins with the fund financial statements and provides detailed information about the most significant funds-not the Town as a whole. Some funds are required to be established by State law. However, many other funds are established to help control and manage money for particular purposes or to show the Town is meeting legal responsibilities for using certain taxes, grants, and other money.

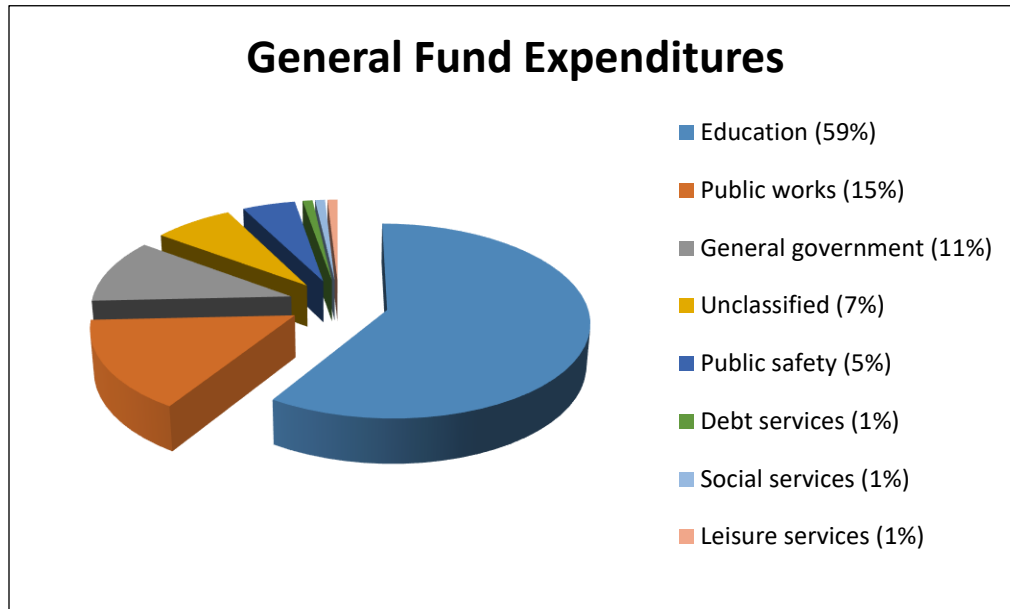
- Governmental funds - All of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds, which focus on how money flows into and out of those funds and the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called modified accrual accounting, which measures cash and all other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed short-term view of the Town's general government operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. We describe the relationship, or differences, between governmental activities, reported in the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities, and governmental funds in reconciliation at the bottom of the fund financial statements.

Capital Assets

As of December 31, 2021, the Town of Pittston's investment in net capital assets for its governmental activities amounted to \$1,640,738 compared to \$1,617,855 last year.

Long Term Liabilities

At year-end, the Town had \$150,489 compared to \$180,489 last year, in outstanding bonds. The outstanding bond is for the construction of the Village Fire Station.

Animal Control Officer Report

Dear Residents of Pittston,

Thank you for welcoming me as your new Animal Control Officer. It has been my pleasure to get to know many Pittston residents over the last year. I welcome any and all phone calls and correspondence from residents regarding animal issues, so feel free to contact me any time with your questions, concerns or complaints.

I would like to take this opportunity to talk about several topics that frequently come up concerning animal ownership. I do receive a lot of lost dog and lost cat calls, so I would like to go over what a person should do when their pet is missing. First, please don't wait to contact your ACO, the sooner a pet is reported missing the better chance there is of finding them. Second, a pet owner whose pet is missing should contact the Kennebec Valley Humane Society (207)626-3491 and the Midcoast Humane Society (207)449-1366 with owner and pet information. You should also post your pet on the unofficial Pittston Facebook page as well as Maine Lost Dog Recovery or Maine Lost Cat Recovery. Owners should also make sure their pet has a collar with owner/pet identity tags and if possible, have their pet micro-chipped.

I get a lot of complaints about noisy/barking dogs. Please be considerate to your neighbors. There is a Barking Dog ordinance in Pittston. A dog cannot be left barking for long periods of time. I also get a lot of loose dog (dog at large) complaints. Be aware that the State of Maine has strict laws with regards to loose dogs harassing/attacking livestock, poultry, humans and other dogs and cats. Dog owners can and will be held responsible financially for damages caused by a loose dog. New laws regarding nuisance and dangerous dogs involve large fines, extra licensing fees and severe restrictions on these animals.

Another topic I would like to address here is rabies. Rabies is REAL and it is out there! It is a state law to have your dogs and cats immunized against this deadly threat to pets, livestock and people.

I would also like to remind residents that it is dog licensing time. Please don't wait to license your dogs because the State of Maine also assesses a mandatory \$25.00 late fee per dog after January 31st each year. You do need to show proof of an up-to-date rabies vaccination to license your dog.

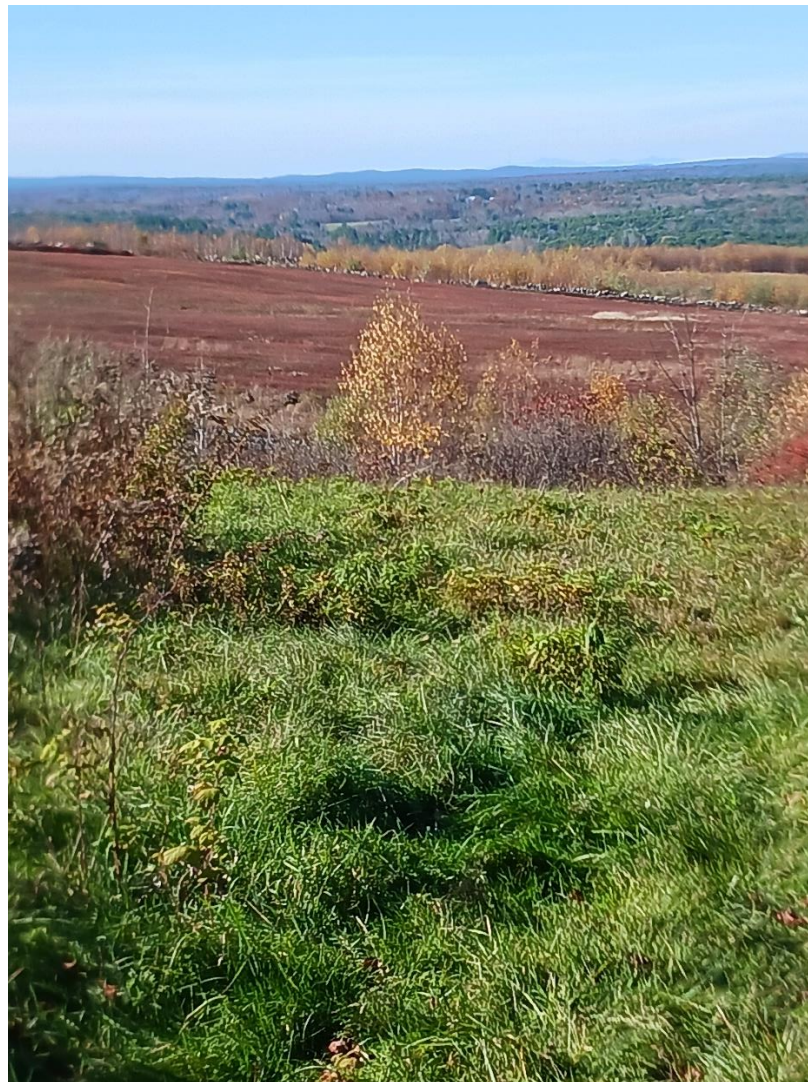
Other topics I would like to mention are feral cats and dog bites. Feral cats are an ongoing issue in a lot of towns in Maine. Please contact me with any questions about supporting feral cat colonies. There are several programs out there who help with feral cats, including the Barn Buddy Program. Your local animal shelter (KVHS) can also point you in the right direction with regards to feral cats. These cats need to be sterilized and vaccinated against rabies. That being said, I urge all responsible pet owners to sterilize their pets. There are thousands of unwanted pets euthanized each year due to non-sterilization.

I receive a lot of dog bite complaints each year and many of these are preventable. Please, never leave a child alone with a dog and always monitor your dog's behavior and your child's behavior when they are together.

In conclusion, I would like to remind people that cold weather is here and Maine State law requires appropriate care and appropriate housing/shelters for livestock and pets. The State of Maine Department of Agriculture/Animal Welfare has a website, office and phone number (207)287-3846.

Appeals Board 2022

The Pittston Board of Appeals met initially on April 16 to elect officers and schedule further meetings. Current members are Becky Symes, Adria Horn, Autumn DeVries, Lisa Veregge and Paula Work. Becky Symes was elected Chair, Autumn DeVries was elected Secretary.

Autumn DeVries participated in the MMA Local Planning Boards & Boards of Appeal Webinar in August at a cost of \$45 from the Board of Appeals budget.

From August through November, Autumn took the lead in reviewing the Board of Appeals manual from MMA in order to craft a document that would help organize and define the Pittston Board of Appeals administrative status, authority and guidelines. Our goal was to create a "User's Guide" for the Pittston appeals process. Due to scheduling conflicts, only initial steps have been reviewed. The Board plans to meet in early 2023 to continue this work.

The first appeal for the year was received December 8, 2022 from Bruce Engert, Pittston CEO. A building permit from Ian Hanson, Arnold Road was denied due to a non-conforming lot size for the property. The appellant was requesting to build a garage on his property, but the residential lot was less than 2 acres (the current minimum lot size). The Appeals Board met on December 12 to consider the appeal.

The Building Code of Pittston has specific criteria for lot size for a single residence based on when the lot was created. The residential lot size for the property under appeal was determined to be a legal non-conforming lot created prior to the current lot size criteria. The Building Code further states that a residence cannot be legally built on a non-conforming lot, but the Appellant was not requesting a residential unit, but rather a garage. The Appeals Board voted (3-0) to allow the construction of a non-residential unit on the legal non-conforming lot.

As of Town Meeting 2023, there will be two openings on the Appeals Board.

I would like to extend my thanks to the members of the Budget Committee: Sam Snow, Larry Ireland, Hope Ricker, Tim Lawrence, Lynette Eastman, Sarah Perkins, Rodney Hembree and Paula Work. I would also like to thank the Select Board and the office personnel for their support.

Pittston has been fortunate to have a group of knowledgeable and supportive volunteers, volunteers who help us maintain the Colburn School and who contribute to our effort to provide a variety of historical and educational exhibits at the annual Pittston Fair. Our exhibits are dynamic, as we greet every visitor and explain its context in Pittston history.

Our last 2-year exhibit focused on our townsmen's support and/or disapproval of the District of Maine's effort to establish statehood. We built a replica of Henry Smith's tavern which was located on the shore of the Kennebec River. His tavern was the site of the four Pittston town meetings that addressed the topic of separation from Massachusetts. Our "tavern" was furnished appropriately for the 1820 time period.

Looking forward to the 2023/2024 exhibit it is likely that we will focus on textiles and fabrics from an extended time period. We have some ideas and will welcome any suggestions that will give us an interesting and educational exhibit.

One new prospect is that we have been asked to take over responsibility for the historical museum; that collection of historical and technical items housed in the old exhibition hall. Dick and Judy Harriman, Curt Jewett and many others worked tirelessly to gather items with a historical context.

Always keep in mind that the Archive Room at the Gardiner Public Library is an outstanding resource for anyone doing Pittston, Gardiner, Randolph, West Gardiner and Farmingdale research.

Pittston Recycling Committee

Pittston's Recycling Center, located next to the Central Fire Station on Rt 126/Whitefield Rd, has been open for 20 years and continues to provide a convenient and environmentally friendly way to dispose of household recyclables. In 2022, Pittston residents recycled 65.78 tons of cardboard, mixed paper, newspaper/magazines, clear glass, tin, and #2 plastics.

The Recycling Center now has two Gardiner Area High School students and Pittston residents, Kole and Dana, working on Saturdays. They are there to help with unloading recyclables from vehicles, making sure material goes into the proper bins or barrels, and keeping the facility neat and tidy.

Here are further details about Pittston's Recycling Center:

Open to all Pittston residents and households.

Hours are Saturdays, 8:00am to 1:00pm.

Items that are recycled -

- corrugated cardboard - flattened (shipping boxes, NOT cereal boxes)
- mixed paper (cereal boxes, envelopes, copier paper, labels off cans and jars, egg cartons)
- Newspaper & Magazines
- Tin (food cans - soup, sauce, vegetable)
- Glass - remove lids (clear, green, and brown)
- #2 plastics (laundry detergent, milk cartons, most shampoo bottles)

Cans and bottles with a 5 cent return can also be left in the Pittston Fire Department's bin.

The Planning Board was very busy again this year with the following applications presented to the board:

Solar Farm on the Pete Kelley property on the Kelley Rd, Caesar Kortuem's Hunts Meadow subdivision amendment on the Moulton Rd, Ann Pistell's site plan revision to a subdivision, Michael and Joyce McCaslin's Self Storage Business on Pittston School St., Sam Snow's Wilderness Estates Subdivision extension on Mabel Lane, Rodney Hembree's Solar Project with Novel Energy on the Wiscasset Rd, Tom LaRosc and Melissa Monaghan's A.B.L. Roofing Business on the Wiscasset Rd and Shyanne Moody's Lil Bucs and Does Day Care expansion on Pittston School St.

Our CEO, Bruce Engert, is always very helpful advising us on many technical aspects of the laws and rules for a variety of applications. The solar projects are quite involved and require additional consulting with Maine Municipal Association at times.

Other projects the Planning Board worked on included working with the Select Board on the Medical Marijuana Ordinance draft, updating the Building Code fees and revising/updating the Planning Board by-laws.

The board is fully staffed with seven members: Terry Shepherd is Vice-Chair, Jim Lothridge, Dan Taggart, Jane Hubert and Pete Kelley. Dan Haiss joined the Planning Board in April as Jane Hubert left to assume her role on the Select Board and Rodney Hembree replaced Jason Daugherty in April also.

A sincere thank you to Debbie MacInnes, our administrative secretary, for keeping us organized and ready for each meeting. She attends every meeting and workshop, records the minutes, posts the agendas, assists the applicants to ensure the correct forms are filled out along with the needed supporting documents, manages the mail, communicates with other town boards, files board documents and tracks the budget. We depend on her consistent organization skills to keep the board meetings running efficiently!

Our meetings are held the SECOND Thursday of every month and we encourage all to attend. We look forward to another productive year in 2023!

Road Commissioners Report

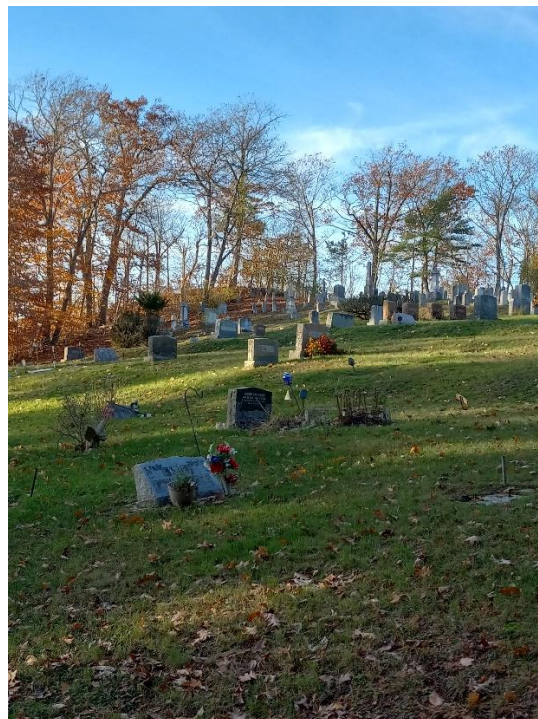

Dear Pittston Residents,

This year we will celebrate the 35th anniversary of the Kennebec Land Trust. With generous support from community members, we have worked to conserve important lands; provide public access for hiking, paddling, skiing, blueberry picking, and hunting; and promote land stewardship, conservation education, and partnerships.

KLT has an impressive list of accomplishments: 100 properties, with 7,584 acres under permanent conservation throughout our 413,000-acre service area; 57 miles of trails to explore; over 20 miles of conserved shoreline; and 1,100 household and business partner members.

As we look to the future, we will continue to conserve high value land and protect important wildlife habitat, and we're also offering programs to promote and expand conservation in ways that better serve our communities.

KLT owns the 50-acre Eastern River Preserve and contributes to Pittston's local tax base through the open space tax program. In 2022 this property was one of four KLT properties featured in *Writing the Land: Maine*, a collection of works by 27 poets inspired by lands representing 13 land trusts. Poet Megan Buchanan and local artist Judith Schuppen focused on the Eastern River Preserve. Copies of the book can be purchased at www.tklt.org/merchandise/writing-the-land-maine.

KLT offers a great selection of outings and educational programs for the public, and we collaborate with schools and other organizations to engage youth and share our conservation message with the community. Please call our office for information about our 2023 field trips and programs. We will be hosting our 35th Anniversary Trail Challenge this summer for community members and visitors.

We welcome this opportunity to communicate with Pittston residents and the Select Board about our conservation work. Everyone is welcome to visit our properties and trails and to attend our public programs.
